

# LETTER FROM THE MANSE June 2024

I want to start off by saying that I had a wonderful time doing the West Highland Way and I finished it with only one blister, getting nearly stuck in one bog and falling once, which I say is not bad for 96 miles in 7 days.

This walk was such an amazing thing and I am so glad I did it and did the whole thing. It amazed me how doing something like this can really impact you.

I will say that I was so nervous even before driving to Fort William to leave my car there. I was speaking with people at a café in the Fort William train station and was given reassurance by a group from the USA, who had just completed parts of it. I then spoke with a family from France, and the mother assured me that I would be fine. I was in complete awe of them as the family, with three children all under the age of 11, had camped every night, except for two nights when the weather was really bad.

At some points, it seemed like it didn't quite matter what people said to me to reassure me that I was going to be fine, I was still quite nervous about going on this adventure.

The day came to begin. I didn't sleep well the night before because of all my nerves but I started my day. I gave the luggage transfer company my big bag and so there was, really, no turning back.

I found my way to the start, took the pictures to mark my beginning, and started off. I started walking, then started remembering why I signed up for this and the nerves started to dissipate.

I wonder how often people get nervous about something new, something unknown, something uncomfortable, or challenging, and allow those nerves to stop us from pursuing something that we have wanted to do.

It can be easy to allow that fear or nervousness to stop you from doing something. One thing that made a big difference for me throughout this adventure was the other people who journeyed with me during each day. It was amazing how much of a difference it made to me each day to have someone to talk with along the way.

There was one day, which was my longest day, 19 miles. The weather forecast was not looking promising, with rain and thunderstorms forecast. I was quite nervous about this, because this was the day when the trail was in the most open, exposed and remote areas. I started making a plan to take a bus or taxi to one spot that was further along the trail, and then do the rest from there.

I spoke with a few other people who were doing the same distance, and they gave me some assurance and encouragement. I realised

I was reassured that the chance of lightning was slim to none, so I did what I could to prepare, including getting some more snacks. I embraced and committed to doing the whole 19 miles and I am so glad I did. Soon after I started, I met 3 people who were walking the same distance, and I walked the rest of the day with them. That made the time go by so well and it was one of my most favourite days.

One thing that I really learned through this adventure is that God provides. I truly experienced this, and I am so grateful to remind myself of this.

My encouragement to each of you is to take a step, and keep going, even when you are nervous or scared. Trust and rely on the goodness of God and that God will provide what you need through each of your adventures.

# ROYAL VISIT TO STONEHAVEN

### STONEHAVEN OPEN AIR SWIMMING POOL

On a lovely summer's day Her Royal Highness Princess Anne visited the Open-air pool on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May to mark the 90 years since the pool opened in 1934. She visited the boiler room and pump room to see all the background workings.

Princess Anne then went on to speak to the groups selected to meet her including myself. She was interested to find out that my sister Margaret was one of the first little people in the pool when it opened in 1934 at the age of six years old. She was also surprised that in earlier times the pool was not heated.

Before the Princess left she said she had enjoyed her visit and unveiled a commemorative plaque to mark the occasion.

### **SEA CADETS UNIT**

After the visit to the Open-Air pool, HRH The Princess Royal, as Admiral of the Sea Cadet Corps, officially inaugurated the new Stonehaven Sea Cadets Unit premises at the town's harbour.

The planning started in January this year for the visit of HRH Princess Anne to officially open the new Sea Cadet Unit and celebrate their 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

The weeks before the visit were spent tidying up the unit, badges were sewn on uniforms, boots brought up to the highest standard, jackets, white fronts and trousers all being pressed to perfection, caps being scrubbed, and everything ready for this momentous day in the calendar.

The weekend of the visit, the cadets were put through a day of drill and marching, which was tiring just watching them!!

In the background, the hall at St Bridget's was set up as "Sandwich Central", where we made 150 grab bags containing a sandwich, fruit, crisps, biscuit and juice for the cadets' lunch. The morning of the Parade day was spent making a buffet lunch for His Majesty's Royal Marine Band, who arrived to lead the parade and more sandwiches to take to the staff at the unit.

The afternoon was a wonderful show. Princess Anne arrived to the cheers of some of the children from Dunnottar Primary. She then took the Royal salute, and after some speeches, was taken on a tour of the Unit, accompanied by Lt Cdr Michael Blacklaw, where she met with different groups of people, and cut a celebratory cake. She then came back outside for the unveiling of the plaque, to mark the opening of the new Unit.

The event was attended by over 300 cadets, parents, volunteers and supporters of the unit, who were all invited to have afternoon tea following the visit, making it a special day for everyone involved.

In June we note two important events – the fifth anniversary of the creation of Stonehaven Carronside and the third anniversary of the induction of Sarah as our minister. Time flies!

As mentioned in church, we have a new Presbytery Clerk who takes up her duties in July. The Rev Stella Campbell, the current Moderator of Presbytery, is demitting her charge at Kingshill to become our new Presbytery Clerk – a full time role in the new set up. Best wishes to Stella.

Session met on 22<sup>nd</sup> May with Elder Moderator David Macdonald in the chair – Sarah being on compassionate leave. We've started looking at forming some new districts to reflect the extended Carronside boundaries, starting with Stonehaven itself. Retired postie, Donald McRae, has been a great help in allocating the streets to district areas. At some point, we will also carry out a review of the Communion Roll to determine how accurate, or otherwise, our records are. We've already found errors just in Donald's allocations, so bear with us meantime. Advising change of addresses to the Church may not be high on people's priority list!

We're struggling to get the St Bridget's boundary wall damage repaired with builders very busy or not interested in the work. If you are able as a builder, or know of somebody, let David Macdonald know! It stood peacefully protecting the boundary since 1888 – until the last few months.

### WALKING THE WEST HIGHLAND WAY

### Our Minister Sarah writes:

There is so much I could say about doing the West Highland Way. It was an amazing adventure, which I am so glad I did. I was quite grateful and lucky with the weather for the whole thing. I met so many people from many different places in the world, including Germany, Belgium, Canada, the States, Israel, and England.

Day One included getting almost stuck knee deep in a bog and coming out covered with mud on my leggings and shoes, but thankfully the guest house I was at offered to wash my leggings and socks and the mud dried on my boots and I was able to brush it off. I enjoyed playing UNO with two girls from Germany and was introduced to their rules, which made the game more fun.

Day Two was hiking up Conic Hill. As I started the walk up, I took a break and chatted with two guys from Belgium about the importance of taking time while doing this to enjoy the beauty and experience of this adventure. I made sure to continue to do this throughout the rest of the whole time. The views at the top of Conic Hill were absolutely amazing. There were many undulations that day, and I was so grateful to see the hotel I was staying at that night.

The next day was the most technical day hiking next to Loch Lomond. I took the high road, as I was told that it was a better road to take. It was just as scenic, and after having heard how challenging the low road was, I was quite grateful for my choice. This was a day of dealing with boulders, trees and tree roots and making sure to not fall. The end of that day was well received.

Day Four was the halfway point, and another lovely day. I walked the second half of the day with a girl who is a university student in Germany. I experienced the kindness and generosity of people that day. It was great to see how language is not a barrier to showing each other kindness.

The next day was my longest day, 19 miles, but one of the most gorgeous days walking through Glen Coe and Rannoch Moor. I was grateful for the three people I walked with the whole time. It made an already great day even better.

Day 6 was my shortest day, but still with its challenges with the Devil's Staircase, and one of the most gruelling down hills on gravel. I was so grateful to reach the village, and for a lot of time to reflect and relax before the final day.

Day 7 came so quickly. I enjoyed speaking with more people going up the last big hill, including a mother and daughter from Germany. I was both ready and not ready for this to end. Reaching the end was bittersweet. I was grateful to not have to lace up my boots the next day, but I will miss the experiences of this walk.

### A BIT OF A BLOG

Rev David T. Lewicki ,who stayed in Stonehaven for 2 weeks and led worship on two Sundays , writes an online blog and I obtained his permission to extract some of it - the Stonehaven section for the magazine.

What a marvellous time I've had in Stonehaven. A huge note of gratitude to Rev. Sarah Smith for letting me stay in her manse while I've been here. It's been a sanctuary of quiet for writing. I've completed drafts of 2 out of the 3 essays I hoped to write during this month!

I left Atlanta at 3:30pm on a Tuesday, flew overnight to Amsterdam, caught the short flight to Glasgow that arrived about 8:30am local time, took a bus to Queen Street station, hopped on a train that trundled across Scotland to Montrose, switched trains at Montrose, exited soon after at Stonehaven station. The taxi dropped me off at the manse of the church in Stonehaven. The church is just outside of town a short way up a hill and next to a nature preserve. I walked in, put my bags down, unpacked all of my clothes into the dresser, fed the resident cat, and sat down. It was 1:30pm local time. I had absolutely no idea internally what time it is, nor how long I was in motion.

Flying is a miraculous and terrifying event. How is it that we wake up on one part of the earth, jump into a metal tube that hurls through the atmosphere and descends through the very middle of meringue clouds, get out, and go to sleep in an entirely other land and culture? Miracle

I nursed myself back to relative strength on Saturday and into Sunday. Which is good, because part of the whole reason I'm here is to lead worship for my friend and former NDPC intern, the Rev. Sarah Smith, who currently serves as the pastor of the Stonehaven Carronside Church in the Church of Scotland. Here's one of the church volunteers calling the community to worship by ringing the church bell--no sissified electronic bells in Scotland, bruh.

The congregation is small--about 50 or so in worship. But they couldn't have been nicer to me. They made me feel welcome from the start, abided by the fact that I really didn't know the order of service well, and they seemed to be able to understand me despite my outrageous American accent. I even got a lovely lunch invitation after worship for quiche. I preached on Matthew's story of the Canaanite woman confronting Jesus and used the story to explore how we human beings think about boundaries, difference, and morality. It's hands-down one of the best stories in the Gospels.

The church in Stonehaven, as is true all over Scotland, has had to do some hard consolidating because of shrinking numbers. The congregation meets in a church building about two miles up the hill. There's a historic cemetery around the church which is quite lovely and brings some serious gravitas. Even though the Stonehaven Carronside church is only 2 miles from town, it feels like a village church.

And religion? Well, I've still got hope for the Church of Scotland. Stonehaven's congregation is small but solid. They are good stewards of their buildings. They do need more people to drive ministries, and, like so many congregations, it would be great if those people were a bit younger than the wonderful people worshiping there now.

The people of Stonehaven seemed a little shell-shocked by a long, cold, wet winter, and I'm quite sure that the timing of my visit in full-on spring buoyed my opinion of the town. I did see so many people out and about, enjoying the sun. On a bright Saturday, even though the temperature barely topped 60, children and adults were wading into the ocean--and they seemed happy about it. There were three different touch rugby games being played by adult men on the fields of the local school. Everywhere I went, people were walking, biking, getting outside.

I'll carry so many memories of Stonehaven with me. But none stronger than this: walking along a quiet lane, the cathedral of tree canopy arching overhead, and just off the path, the sound--the sound!--of water falling on stone.

Just living in Stonehaven, with the ability to walk around, look at things, talk to people, has been wonderfully nourishing in this sense. Stonehaven is a beautiful small town. Geographically, and in terms of its natural features, it's hard to find a place more lovely. This "seeing" our home in a wider perspective, I think, is also deeply humanizing--it makes you feel small, but paradoxically, like you also belong to a larger whole.

I'm grateful for the wonderful hospitality I received in Stonehaven!

We frequently receive compliments on how good our buildings look, inside and outside. Keeping our buildings in good condition does not happen by accident. It happens because our members and the members of the wider community in Stonehaven show how much they care by treating them with respect. It also happens because so many people report damage or wear and tear to me as soon as they become aware of it. Please keep up the good work of making these reports!

These repairs all cost money, and this is part of what our offerings, donations and fundraisers pay for.

For bills that are too large for this, such as the roof repairs at Dunnottar a few years ago and the South Church roof more recently, and for the refurbishment of the Manse during the vacancy, we were able to access funds that we hold in the Church of Scotland's Consolidated Fabric Fund. When a Church building is sold, the proceeds are invested in this fund on our behalf. We can only use these funds for repairs or improvements to our buildings. We have to submit our plans and the estimated costs to Presbytery and can only start work after Presbytery has approved.

It would be great if you could spare some time to assist with any of the tasks involved with either the "bread and butter" or the "big ticket" property issues.
